So, what has POVA been up to?

POVA has worked hard for the past two years to revitalize our Association and set it up for long-term growth and future success. Since our new officers have been in place, POVA has been very busy. Here are some things we've accomplished or are in the process of accomplishing since 2015:

- rebuilt our membership base to recruit/retain younger veterans, with a total roster now approaching 400 Psywarriors, friends, and families. We also expanded our Life Member ranks from 11 in 2015 to 93 as of this writing;
- designed, acquired, and issued membership certificates for each category of POVA membership (Life, Reserve, Gold Star), and issued both Membership and Life Membership pins;
- totally redesigned and launched our new website (www.usapova.com);

- designed and promoted several POVA-branded clothing items and our unique POVA Challenge Coin to raise funds for our philanthropic commitment:
- established the POVA newsletter "The Leaflet Drop" as a regular monthly publication;
- opened a POVA Facebook group that serves as an additional communication channel;
- completed POVA's incorporation as a not-for-profit corporation in Michigan AND achieved IRS approval as a 501c3 charitable and educational organization;
- rebuilding our Gold Star family program to honor the sacrifices of these families;
- gained significant membership participation from USACAPOC Commanding General and Command Sergeant Major, Commanding Officers of the 2d and 7th PSYOP Groups and their CSM's, and several Reserve Battalion Commanders;
- expanded membership in the active-duty PSYOP/MISO.....both Group Commanders are POVA Life Members, and one incoming Group Commander is already a POVA Life Member. Our membership also includes several retired 4th Group Commanding Officers and Honorary Colonels of the PSYOP Regiment;
- currently finalizing a POVA member database to consolidate member information, addresses, etc., to streamline communication, dues management, etc.;
- successfully accomplished placement of the names of "missing" Viet-Nam PSYOP KIA's on the Memorial Wall at USASOC Meadows Field, Ft. Bragg, NC;
- established recognition awards for soldiers and veterans who have made very significant lifetime contributions to the profession of military psychological operations. The first two of these "Exemplars of Military Psychological Operations" were awarded in August 2016. A new award focused on Psywarrior "operators" will be announced soon.
- Currently creating the basis for regionally-focused POVA chapters, the goal being for each chapter to become a local charitable organization raising funds to assist fellow veterans and their families in need:

These are the major initiatives on which POVA has been working in the past year, and these will continue for the foreseeable future as there is simply so much to do. There are other activities in which we're involved or plan to become involved, and we'll continue to focus on these as well.

There is room to participate for every single member of POVA.....these projects are rewarding in the sense of accomplishment and in the very reality that we are helping other veterans, soldiers, and families.

A Reserve 10th POB Soldier Making a Difference (Written by Joe Harris in the St. Louis Post Dispatch, shared by Psywarrior Brian Cox)

Joining the Army's psychological operations unit was the best decision Audrey Johnsey ever made. Johnsey's two grandfathers both served in World War II, her father served in Vietnam and her cousin served in the Navy. so military service was a natural fit for her and her twin sister. Her sister joined the Navy six months before she signed up. After her sister told her that she wished she had joined the Army instead, Johnsey decided that's where she was going.

"A good friend of mine helped me when I enlisted," Johnsey said. "He took me to the recruiter's office and he was in psych operations and said, 'I think you'll be really great at that.' And at the time there was a bonus incentive for enlisting for that job so I

was like, 'yeah, I'll go for it.' I had no idea what it was at the time, but it was one of the best uninformed decisions I ever made." Johnsey joined as an E-1, the lowest rank. Nine years later, Johnsey, 28, is a sergeant in the reserves. She has been all over the world, primarily the Middle East through deployments to Afghanistan and Iraq, as part of the 307th Psychological Operations, which is a part of the 10th Psychological Operations Battalion.

Psychological operations' motto is to persuade, change and influence. That is accomplished in a variety of ways from handing out soccer balls to children to gaining the trust and providing aid to those in need. "For me in particular, when I was deployed, I was able to engage the female population, which up until 2010 had never been engaged," Johnsey said. "So that's a war that we've been fighting essentially for 10 years and 50 percent of the population hadn't been engaged." Johnsey and her group went on missions into the villages to speak to the Afghan women. When they visited homes, they were always offered tea and melons. Johnsey said the Afghans are a very welcoming people. "There was one instance where this man was a very influential person in the village we were going to visit and he had four wives and he said, 'If you come, I have many children. Please respect our culture,'" Johnsey said. "So we borrowed scarves from our interpreters. It wasn't a hijab, but it covered our hair. It more or less a visual symbol of respect to them."

Johnsey believes they still would have been welcomed if they had refused, but it was easier to gain their trust by being respectful. She compares it to the Catholic faith, who welcomes all to their Sunday mass, but requests non-Catholics to not take communion. On another mission, they passed out birthing kits to the women. "When women give birth, they give birth in their houses, but they don't have the utensils to cut the umbilical cord, they don't have sterile gloves to catch the baby, they don't have sterile clothes to wrap the baby in," Johnsey said "So they have an incredibly high mortality rate among children and they have a very high miscarriage rate in women because of the unsanitary conditions."

One other mission involved the Kuchi, a nomadic people who lived around the mountains. Johnsey and her unit noticed that many of their children were missing toes due to frost bite, so they were able to get thick socks and insulated boots to them. "We weren't trying to get information out of them," Johnsey said. "It was, 'what can we do to help you?' There was a situation where a kid had already lost his toes, but at least he's not going to lose the circulation to his feet next winter."

Johnsey, who works with freight in the logistics industry, spent nine years in the 307th PSYOP Company. She recently transferred to the 318th Company, where she was reunited with her mentor, Sgt. First Class Joshua Herbig, whom she credits for her success in the Army. "When I enlisted in the military, he was in charge of me essentially," Johnsey said. "I think that because of his guidance and his ability to recognize that each soldier has different needs that I was able to become the leader that I am today."

Viet-Nam KIA's Missing from USASOC Wall at Meadows Field.....Almost Complete

Since April 2015, POVA has been working to add the names of four PSYOP dead from Viet-Nam to the wall of honor at Meadows Field in Ft. Bragg. With the assistance and cooperation of Dr. Jared Tracy of the USASOC Historian's Office, three of the names have been approved....John Blanco, Darrel Sills, and John Lynch. A fourth name, John Martin Sanford, has not yet been approved because, for some inexplicable reason, his military records cannot be located to confirm details surrounding his death.

1LT Martin died when the C130 he was riding in crashed into a mountain, killing all aboard. He is buried in Arlington National Cemetery.



POVA Life Member Bob Martinez's Seminal Work on Viet-Nam: The Long Way Home Project

There are many histories of Viet-Nam, but one can never be sure of the authenticity, truth, integrity, or honesty of those who produce these; too often, they are loaded with political assinity to support one or another interpretation, with the end result being that truth and real history are avoided or ignore. An excellent review of this project is appended to the newsletter.

Winner of the 2002 Houston Film Festival, this film interviews dozens of key contributors and participants, including many soldiers who served at various times in the war. Bob Martinez, an officer in the 4th PSYOP Group from 1969-70, is interviewed as well. Key interviews include several retired General Officers who led combat forces in the Nam, including Gen-Ret. Don Starry, with introduction by the late Gen-Ret. Norman Schwarzkopf.

One of the key features of this film is that it tells a story without also political or revisionist proselytizing. It just tells the story and lets the facts speak for themselves. 

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THE LONG WAY HOME PROJECT

Looking at history from the vantage of 30 years time allows the beginning of historical objectivity and a reasoned analysis of events. The Long Way Home Project is a very well crafted attempt to analyze the U.S. involvement in Vietnam since 1940. Each episode is an excellent blend of historical images and live interviews with either participants, politicians, or historians who quite obviously have done some real thinking about the implications of the Vietnam War in terms of American and Southeast Asian civilization. An introduction by Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf repeated at the start of each episode places the series and the individual episodes in context.

Men Versus Myth explores the strategic location and historical interest of Vietnam to Chinese and Japanese imperialism, French colonial interests, and the spread of communism during the Cold War. It also examines assumptions about the composition of the American Forces (2.39 million served from 1964 to 1973) and domestic support.

How We Won the War examines early mistakes in political and military strategies and contrasts American successes during several North Vietnamese offensives with U.S. domestic perceptions of battlefield failure portrayed by the media and echoed by politicians. A credible argument is made that at some point the United States won the war but failed to recognize the victory at home and ultimately failed to provide sufficient support to the South Vietnamese military and government.

How We Lost the War explains how diplomacy and the failure of the United States to live up to the promises of support to the Republic of Vietnam made in conjunction with the 1974 Geneva Accords made it impossible for South Vietnam to avoid falling to a full-scale invasion from the North in 1975.

The New Diaspora starts from an anthropological and cultural history of the Vietnamese peoples and explores several waves of refugee emigrations during and following the reunification of Vietnam in 1975.

These videos present a reasoned, unemotional reassessment of the American involvement in Vietnam and are refreshingly devoid of particular political axes to grind or fingers to point. The production values are excellent: sound, editing, narration, titles, engineering are all of the highest quality. An adult topic handled in an adult manner but without offensive language. Very highly recommended.
